When I was first offered to write this column, I wasn't excited about the money (paid only 1

Recently, I got to conduct the Kindred Spirits Orchestra (www.ksorchestra.ca) at the CBC Glenn Gould Studio. I feel sorry for the 40 professionally trained musicians who probably felt like they were part of a finely tuned April Fools joke.

playing Guitar Hero and ends at singing Taylor Swift songs on karaoke. To make sure the orchestra doesn't miss a beat, Maestro Kristian Alexander puts me through conductor training back stage. I start with my arms high and extended. Alexander tells me that as soon as Ilower my conductor's baton, the orchestra will start playing. "The orchestra members' ages range from late-20s to mid-60s. Many hold a master's degree in music. When we first started, we had over 150 applicants vying to audition for 48 positions... Good luck," says Alexander, doing his best to calm my nerves.

Showtime: I sheepishly walk on stage, ready to lead a full orchestra. The musicians welcome me by tapping their instruments – which Alexander tells me is a tradition whenever a new conductor enters the stage, even a fake one apparently.

I start swinging my arms

slowly, but start to feel the music take over and quickly work myself into a frenzy.

It's only a four minute song but my arms are burning as they flail around like a rag doll. Forget Tae Bo, if you want a real workout, try conducting in a tuxedo. There's no rhyme, rhythm, or reason to my actions as the orchestra soldiers on in spite of me. I'm afraid I'm going to fling sweat into an oboe in the first row before the song ends.

The Kindred Spirits Orchestra's next show is on April 8 at 8:00 p.m. in the CBC Glenn Gould Studio. Alexander will be conducting Beethoven's *Third Symphony*.

The orchestra has donated tickets to Dixon Hall Music School, a group that provides children from low-income families with free music lessons.

Who knows, maybe a lucky guest conductor from the audience will also get to make beautiful music together with these talented musicians. Just make sure to bring a towel.

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
